A few years ago a group of salesmen went to a regional sales convention in Chicago...they had assured their wives that they would be home in plenty of time for Friday night's dinner. In their rush, with tickets and briefcases, one of these sales men inadvertently kicked over a table which held a display of apples. Apples flew everywhere. Without stopping or looking back, they all managed to reach the plane in time for their nearly-missed boarding. ALL BUT ONE!! He paused, took a deep breath, got in touch with his feelings and experienced a twinge of compassion for the girl whose apple stand had been overturned. He told his buddies to go on without him, waved good-bye, told one of them to call his wife when they arrived at their home destination and explain his taking a later flight. Then he returned to the terminal where the apples were all over the terminal floor. He was glad he did. The 16year-old girl was totally blind! She was softly crying, tears running down her cheeks in frustration, and at the same time helplessly groping for her spilled produce as the crowd swirled about her; no one stopping and no one to care for her plight. The salesman knelt on the floor with her, gathered up the apples, put them back on the table and helped organize her display. As he did this, he noticed that many of them had become battered and bruised; these he set aside in another basket. When he had finished, he pulled out his wallet and said to the girl, "Here, please take this \$40 for the damage we did. Are you okay?" She nodded through her tears. He continued on with "I hope we didn't spoil your day too badly." As the salesman started to walk away, the bewildered blind girl called out to him, "mister..." He paused and turned to look back into those blind eyes. She continued, "Are you Jesus?" He stopped in mid-stride... and he wondered. He gently went back and said, "No, I am nothing like Jesus—He is good, kind, carrying, loving, and would never have bumped into your display in the first place. "The girl gently nodded: "I only asked because I prayed for Jesus to help me gather the apples. He sent you to help me, so you are like Him—only He knows who will do His will. Thank you for hearing His call, Mister." Then slowly he made his way to catch the later flight with that questions burning and bouncing about in his soul: "Are you Jesus?"

Do people mistake you for Jesus? That's our destiny, is it not? To be so much like Jesus that people cannot tell the difference as we live and interact with a world that is blind to His love, life and grace. If we claim to know Him, we should live, walk and act as He would. Knowing Him is more than simply quoting scripture and going to church. It's actually living the Word as live unfolds day to day. You are the apple of His eye even though you, too, have been bruised by a fall. He stopped what He was doing and picked up you and me on a hill called Calvary and paid in full for our damaged fruit.

Sometimes we just take things for granted, when we really need to be sharing what we know. The eyewitnesses to Jesus' life record repeatedly that he was a man who took time to literally touch people. He shared moments with those who needed to tell their stories. He hung out with the sinful (in their homes) and he did it without condemnation. So are you Jesus...to anyone?


Congregational Meeting—Nov. 3, 13

Playing Catch Up

Dear Church, at the end of September our operating income is \$30,000 below budget. This means we are not meeting our Church's operating needs. \$30,000 is well over half of Pastor Bob's compensation package. \$30,000 is our budget for utilities and custodial services alone. These are things we cannot pay without your tithes and offerings. Our church cannot survive with a \$30,000 deficit!

Just so you know, the ramp we are building and the new parking lot and roof were not taken out of operating funds. We were blessed with additional funding for these projects. Our operating expenditures are the basic needs of the church: staff salaries, church utilities and maintenance, committee program expenses and a small portion going to mission outreach programs.

We know it's too late in the year for us to make up that kind of loss, but if you could pray about this and find a little more to give to your church before the end of the year, it would make a big difference.

Maybe you could do some personal or group fundraising with the proceeds going to our operating budget. If you are not up to date on your pledge or you know you haven't done your part this year, now would be a great time to CATCH UP!

Thank you very much for considering getting us back on track this year. In the next Chimes issue we will have pledge cards for next year. So please start praying with your family about what your commitment will be.
